

Data Protection for Community Groups

Principles of Data Protection.

Data protection is about protecting people's privacy. This is the purpose of data protection in any organisation, and is at the heart of data protection law, including the new <u>General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)</u> that comes into force in May 2018. The most important step towards protecting privacy and complying with the <u>GDPR</u> is understanding some basic principles. These are:

- Know what personal data is.
- Only collect, store or use personal data if your group needs to do so for a clear, specific <u>purpose</u>.
- Only collect, store and use the minimum amount of data you need for your purpose.
 Don't keep extra data if you don't know why you need it, and don't keep data that is no longer needed for a clear purpose.
- Make sure people know how to contact you if they want you to remove their data from your records.
- <u>Tell people what data you have about them</u> if they ask you to, and <u>remove</u> it if requested.
- <u>Store</u> data securely.
- Be clear whether data belongs to your group or to you personally. Just because you have access to contact details held by the group, doesn't mean they are your personal contacts.

If you keep these principles in mind, you are likely to be respecting people's privacy and meeting the fundamental requirements of the <u>GDPR</u>.
